



- **B.** Cheri A. Lindsey Park In 1984, Stow Park was renamed Cheri A. Lindsey Park in remembrance of Cheri, age 12, who was murdered that year while collecting for her Evening Press paper route. The Lindsey's have worked to make the park a safe and fun environment for children.

- C. <u>Bevier Street Bridge</u> Opened in 1965 as part of the Interstate 81 development, it replaced a metal truss bridge originally at DeForest Street.
- **D.** Otsiningo Park This site was home to Native Americans until the 19th century. Several excavations in the area have revealed many artifacts. Built by the NYS Department of Transportation, Broome County assumed the 84 acre park in 1977. Otsiningo Park is one of the most popular parks in the region and hosts the annual Spiedie Fest and Balloon Rally.






- F. <u>Veteran's Park and Memorial Garden</u> In 1915, Binghamton acquired this land which was originally planned as an extension of the Chenango Canal. Numerous memorials are located throughout the park including one that honors the man who saved a copper leaf beech tree in the park.
- **G.** South Washington Street Bridge Designed by William O. Douglas in 1886. Longest triple parabolic bridge of its kind in the U.S.

- **H.** Confluence Park General James Clinton and his Colonial Army was encamped here on route to meet General John Sullivan during the Revolutionary War campaign against the Iroquois in 1779.
- I. <u>Memorial Bridge</u> Built in 1925 to accommodate increased traffic from the west side to downtown. Four bridge-corner plaques honor those who served in World War I.
- J. <u>Tyler Park</u> During the first half of the 20th century, Tyler Park ran along the Chenango River adjacent to Wall Street. A memorial to the victims of the 2009 American Civic Association tragedy is located on the southeast corner.
- K. <u>East Clinton Street Bridge</u> John A. Roebling designed a "Ferry Street" suspension bridge c.1855. The existing Art Deco style bridge was built in 1937 after an 1897 iron bridge was destroyed in the 1935 flood.
